October 7, 2022

Suspicious

Home owner called stating that he had gotten a motion alert on his camera system. He saw a male walking in his driveway toward the side of his yard. While waiting for our arrival, he saw the same male walk westbound down the street. He appeared confused, was hunched forward, and was shuffling his feet. The area was searched for over an hour when a different homeowner called stating there was a male on their back porch acting confused. This was the same male and had left Ogden Regional AMA for detox treatment. He was still very confused, had torn clothing with scratches on his legs, and had a deformed right shoulder/collarbone area. Medical transported him back to Ogden Regional for treatment.

Significant Events

October 23, 2022

Agg Assault

Deputies responded to Cambridge Crossing Apartments on the report of a domestic violence incident involving a male and two females. It was reported by a third party that the male and females were arguing in the parking lot and the male pointed a handgun at the females. Prior to arrival the male began to leave the area. He was stopped at the entrance to the apartment complex and detained. During the investigation, it was determined that the male was intoxicated. SFSTs were performed and he was found to be DUI. Further investigation showed that he had pointed the handgun at the two females. The male was arrested and placed in handcuffs. During this time he became combative and Deputies had to use physical force to subdue him. The male was taken to the jail and booked on the charges of Aggravated Assault x2, DUI, Carrying a Dangerous Weapon while under the influence of Alcohol, Obstructing an investigation, and Disorderly Conduct.

Significant Events

November 11, 2022

Prowler

Homeowner called stating that a male was trying to break into his home. The male suspect attempted several times to open the back door to the home. While en route, the homeowner stated the male was using a chair to climb into the neighbor's yard. Dispatch received a 911 call from the neighbor stating that the male had tried to open their back door and was now kicking the windows in the basement. Upon the arrival of deputies, they found the suspect in the backyard laying under a BBQ tarp and he was taken into custody. The suspect stated he believed he was in Bluffdale looking for his wife that was kidnapped by the illuminati. He was wearing shorts and a t-shirt in 20 degrees. It was determined he had parked his vehicle 3 blocks away approximately 3 hours earlier. He was taken to Davis ER as he had lacerations on his hands, hypothermia, and he was pink sheeted for the psychosis. The hospital admitted him; his vehicle was safe keep towed. The first homeowner has over an hour of video of the suspect in his backyard.

Significant Events

January 11, 2023

Attempted Rape; Aggravated Arson; Tazing

A male attempted to commit sexual assault against the 43 y/o daughter of his ex-wife. The victim escaped and called 911. The first deputy on scene found the suspect on the front porch armed with a knife, two bystanders nearby, and the house behind him on fire. Negotiations failed and the suspect was subsequently tased (safely away from the fire) and taken into custody. Fire departments arrived on scene and extinguished the blaze before completing a thorough arson investigation.

Male suspect was booked into the Davis County Jail for Aggravated Arson, Aggravated Kidnapping, Aggravated Burglary, Aggravated Sexual Abuse, and other charges. During interviews, he admitted to going to the South Weber residence to harm his ex-girlfriend. At the residence, he encountered the daughter of his intended victim. He bound her with tape, handcuffed her, and sexually assaulted her while armed with a knife. The victim was able to escape. He set the house on fire and was detained by patrol.

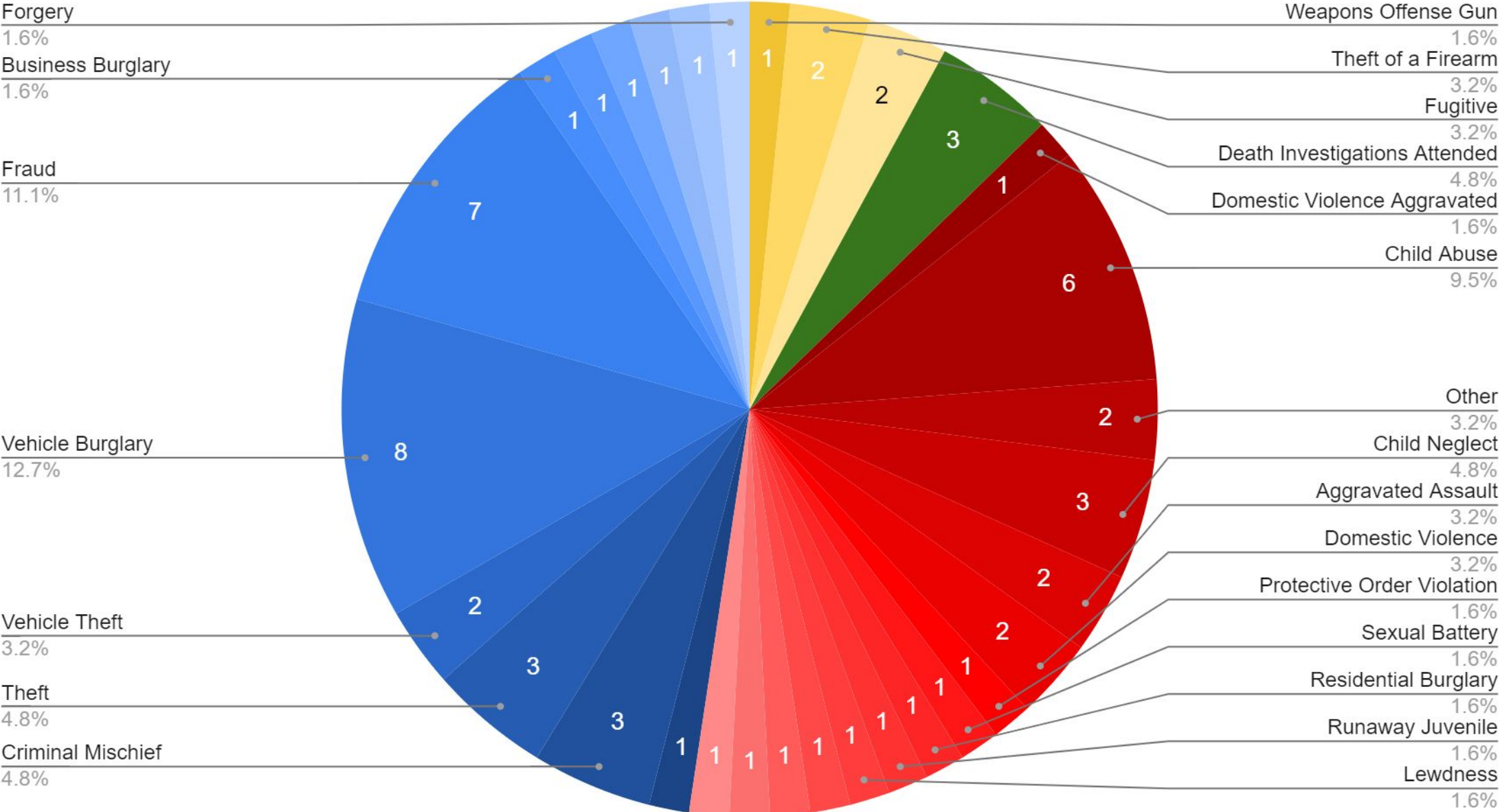



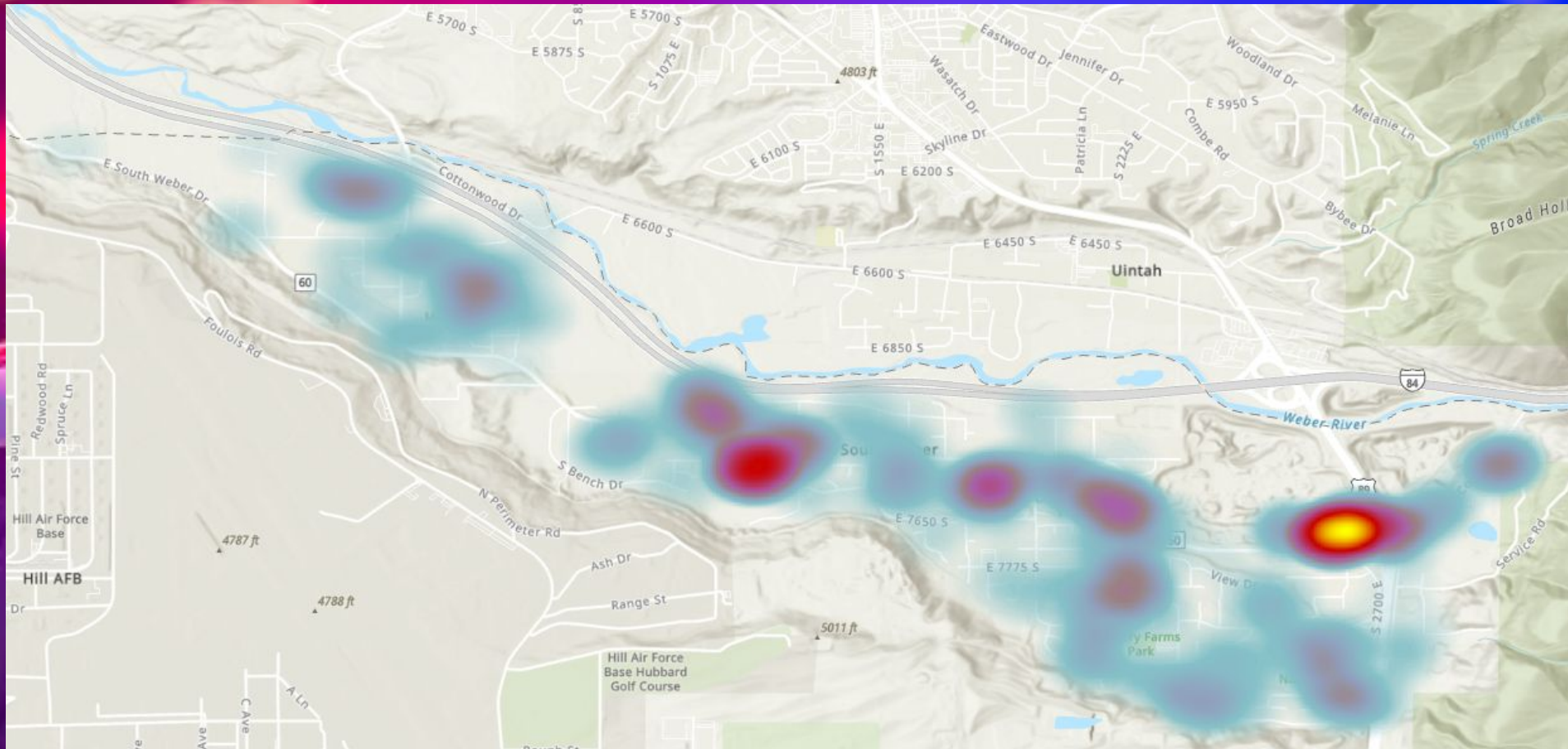
Crime Investigated by Crime Offense



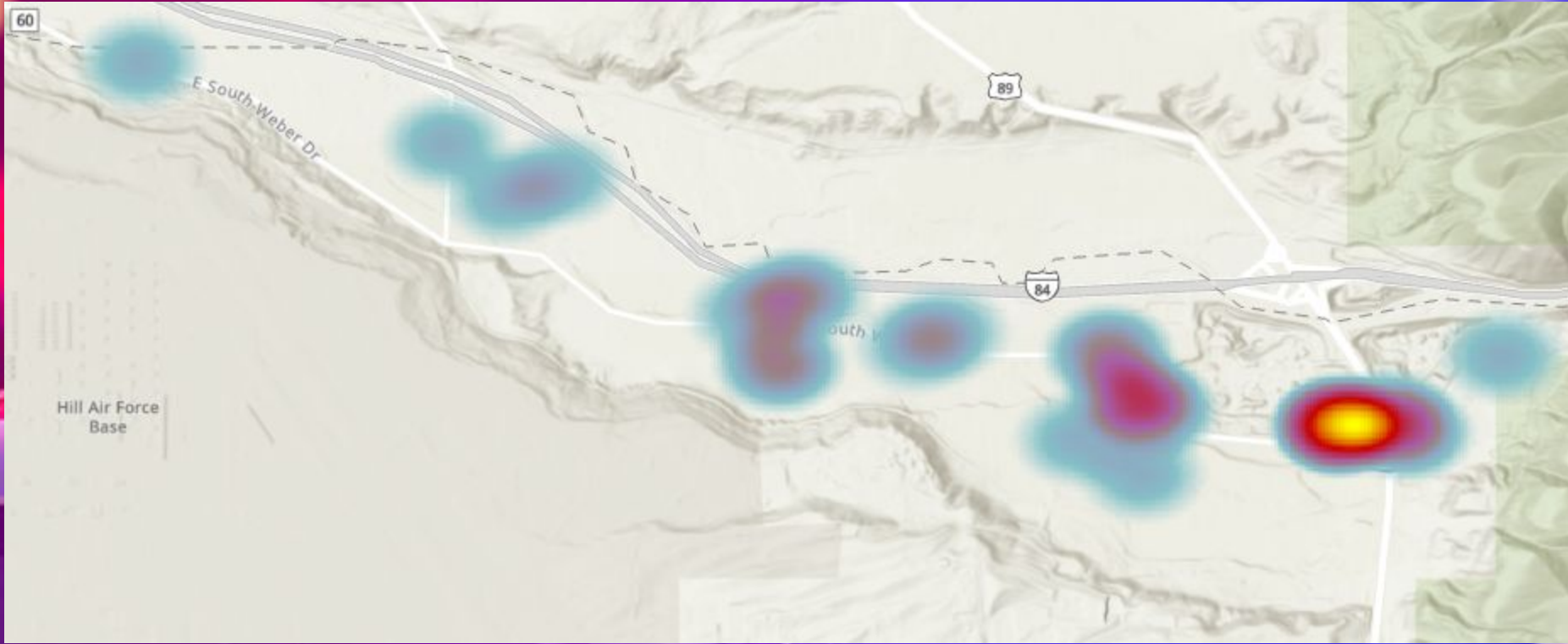

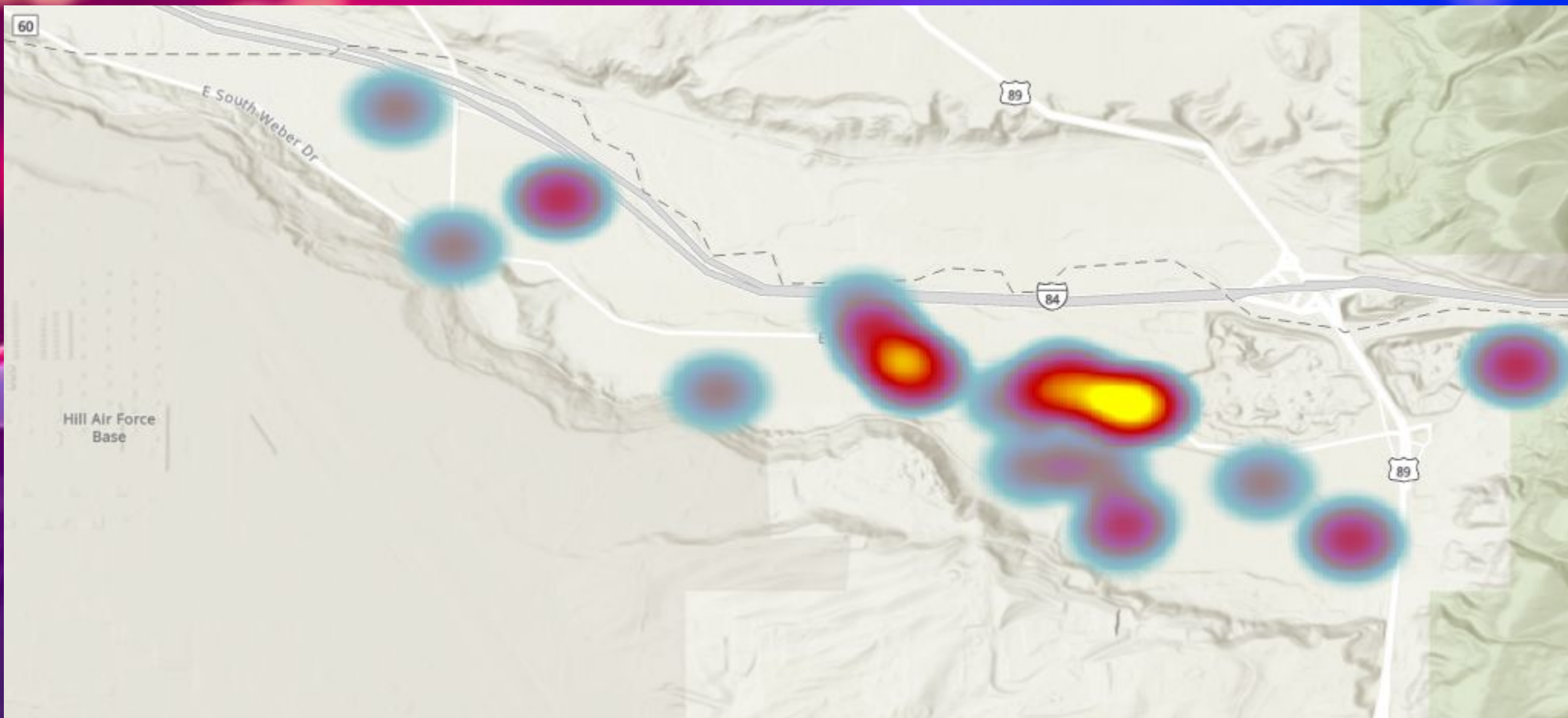

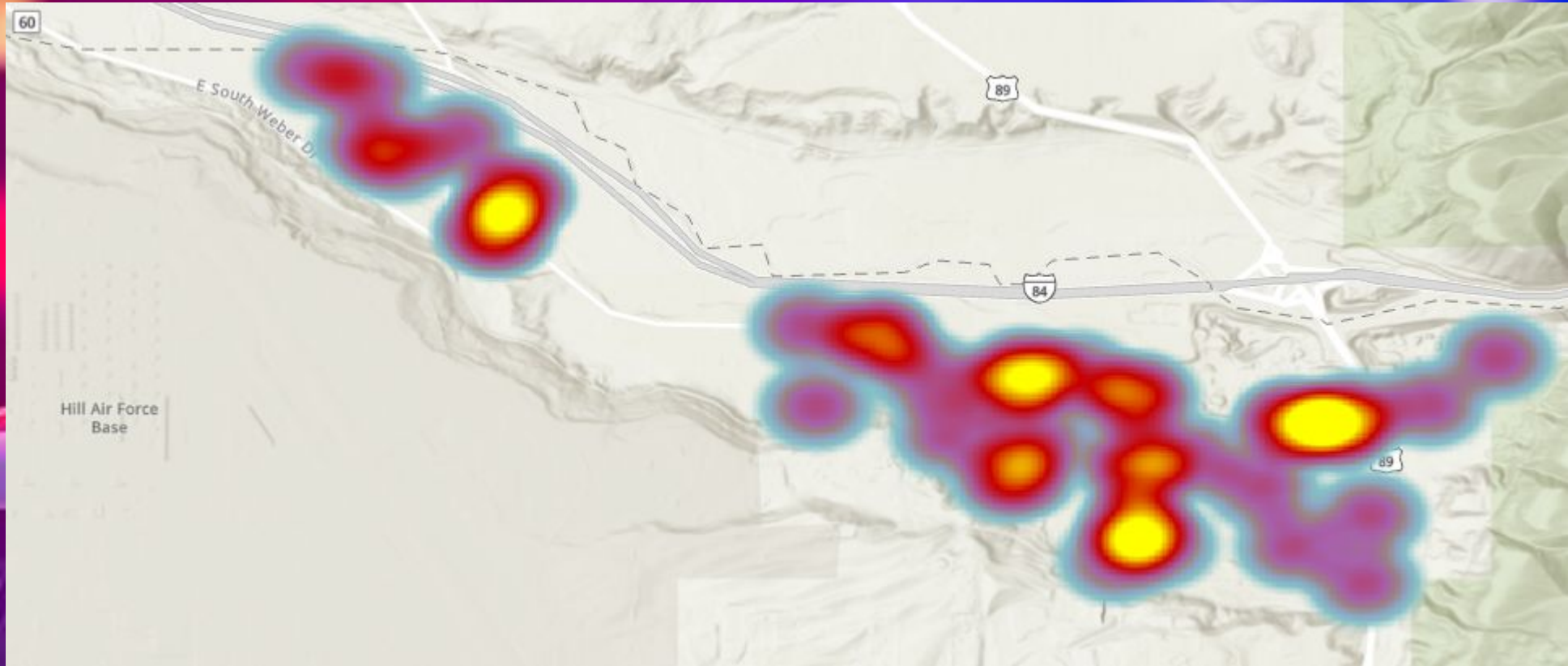

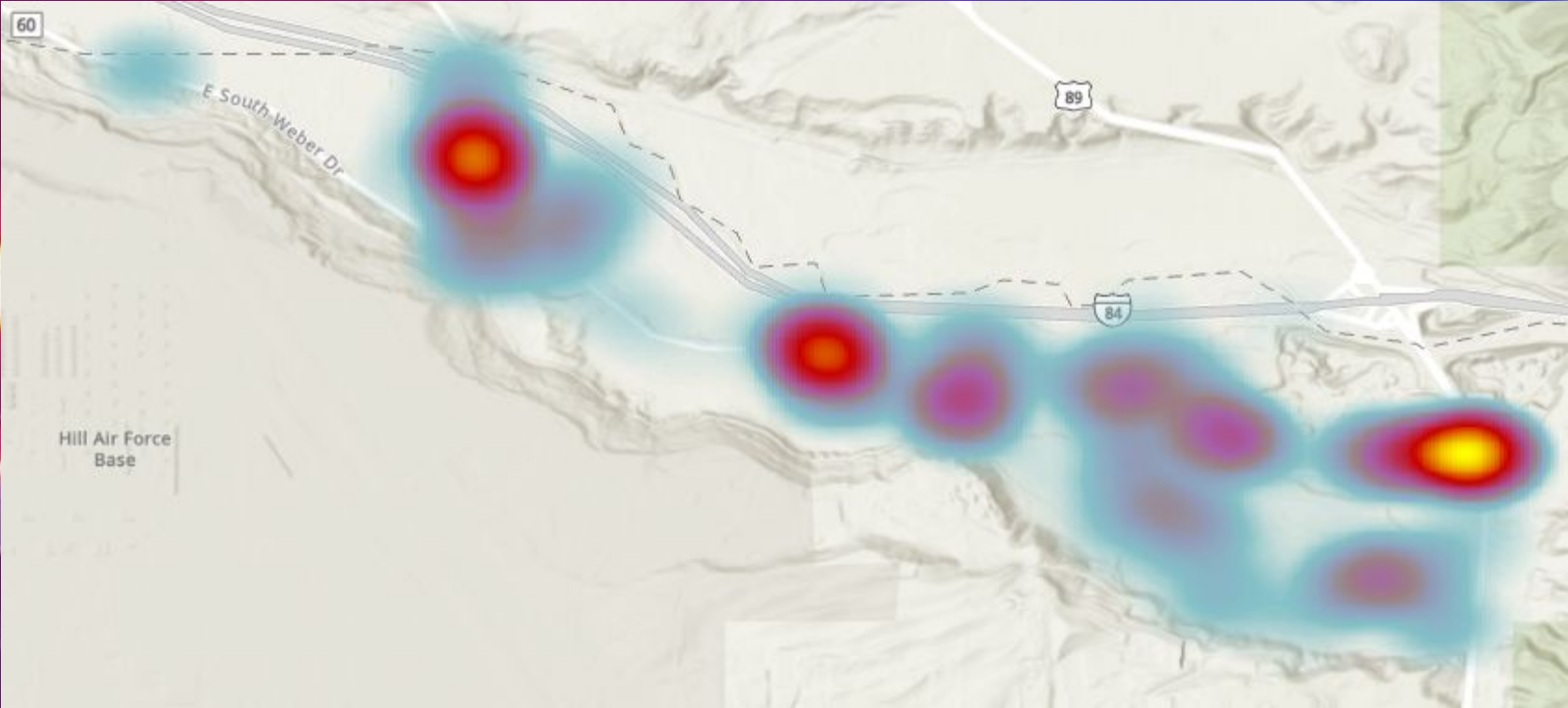

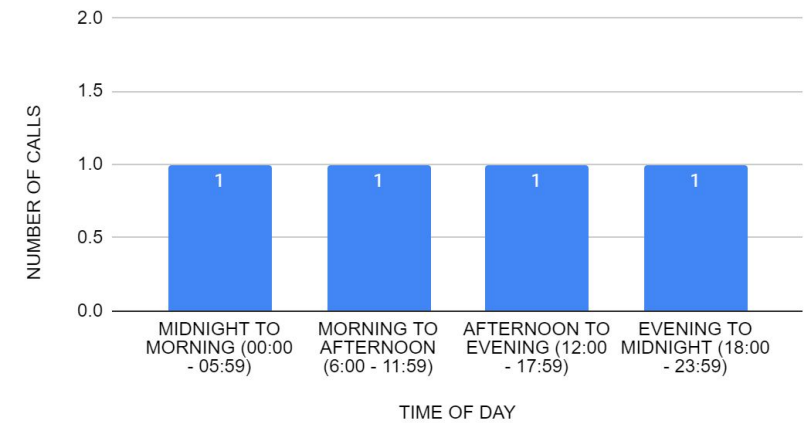

FUNCTION

- Supply fire streams (hoses and large-scale waterway)
- Provide initial and continuing water supply
- Provide personnel with SAFE access to elevated areas (ground ladder complement and aerial device)
- Provide elevated master fire stream.
- Provide access to areas that ground ladders cannot
- High point anchor for technical rescue operations
- Various other functions for rescue
- Water rescue
- Below grade rescue
- Tree rescues

FUNCTION

- When responding to a fire in a 2-story or higher building, a Quint provides greater capabilities with fewer firefighters. This can Aid in Life Safety (victim rescue) Provide for less damage to homes Provide a faster means of fire attack Increase Firefighter safety

FUNCTION

- Aerial apparatus must be first or second on scene
- Placement is critical to the operation
- COLLAPSE zones MUST be considered (leading to correct aerial size)

NEED

- The “old school” rule governing whether a fire district required an aerial device, or not, was based on when the portable ground ladders within a fire department would no longer reach the upper windows or the roof of buildings in the community, then an aerial device was needed. This is a simple but yet often overlooked way of justifying your purchase, for the rule still stands true. As sufficient as that may be, there are still other justifications to consider. The following are a few additional consideration:

NEED

- It typically takes 3 or more firefighters to raise and place a long ground ladder. If at any given time a department has insufficient personnel to achieve this task safely and without exposure to injury, while issuing an attack and laying out hose lines, then an aerial device is needed.
- If the terrain and topography within a community make using ground ladders unsafe, an aerial device is needed. Terrain and landscape oddities may make it impossible for firefighters to gain access to two or three story structures with ground ladders. Under this condition, an aerial device is needed to perform necessary rescue or ventilating operations.

NEED

- An aerial device can significantly improve a fire district's ISO rating, lowering a community's property insurance premiums.
- Consideration needs to be given to the demographics of the population of your community. Increasing levels of obesity, aging, and disabled population may make it impractical to rescue a certain percentage of those you serve safely from even a second story window, without a platform apparatus

NEED

- Communities with large square footage buildings, such as warehouses, large department stores, etc. require a safe means of delivery fire suppression from an elevated position. This can increase firefighter safety by minimizing the need for dangerous interior attacks.
- Communities with standing or running water that pose drowning hazards will benefit from increased reach capabilities that an aerial device will provide during rescue operations.

ISO

Section 540 of the Insurance Services Office (ISO) Fire Suppression Rating Schedule specifically states, "Response areas with 5 buildings that are 3 stories or 35 feet or more in height, or [have] 5 buildings that have a Needed Fire Flow greater than 3,500 gpm, or any combination of these criteria, should have a ladder company." To receive the highest points in an ISO evaluation for ladder service, the ladder unit must reach the roof of the tallest building in its service area or be 100' long, whichever is less.

NFPA

Recommendations in the National Fire Protection Association's Fire Protection Handbook, 17th edition:

- High-hazard occupancies (schools, hospitals, nursing homes, high-rise buildings): at least four pumpers, two ladder trucks, and other specialized apparatus as may be identified or available for the hazard.
- Medium-hazard occupancies (apartments, offices, mercantile and industrial occupancies not normally requiring extensive rescue or firefighting capabilities): at least three pumpers, one ladder truck, and other specialized apparatus as may be identified or available.
- Low-hazard occupancies (one-, two-, or three-family dwellings and scattered businesses and industrial occupancies): at least two pumpers, one ladder truck, and other specialized apparatus as may be identified or available.
